



What have you done for your community today?



On February 29th, 2020 CCA volunteers and board members gathered at the Upstate shelter to meet Rhonetta Thomas and her family in person as we celebrated the life – and animal-loving legacy – of her daughter Jayla. Last year, Jayla Thomas passed away as the result of a homicide, just days after her 21st birthday. Jayla would have been 22 on February 13. Jayla is remembered as a beautiful and creative person who had a huge heart for people and animals. Despite being allergic to dogs, she was determined to spend her life caring for them and dreamed of one day owning a home with a lot of land and plenty of room for dogs.

This dream of hers is why, when Rhonetta set out to honor Jayla's memory and love of dogs with a fundraiser, she chose CCA. "When I saw the photos online, I thought of Jayla's dream of having land with a lot of dogs, and this just looked like somewhere she would want to be," she explained.

Through a Facebook Fundraiser, Rhonetta raised \$625 for CCA, which she presented at the shelter celebration on Saturday. Since then, an additional \$200+ in donations have been made in Jayla's honor. Following the check presentation, Rhonetta and her family toured the shelter and saw the patio where we will be installing a brick in Jayla's memory.

This isn't the end though! Rhonetta shared that she would like to partner with CCA in honor of Jayla's birthday every year. "We would like to do something special too," said CCA Board President Kim Ledford. "We aren't sure what that will look like yet, but we would like to celebrate Jayla's kindness and how she always tried to put others before herself."

While we think of the perfect way to honor Jayla next year, we wanted to thank Rhonetta and her family for including us in celebrating her daughter's life. Her donation will make an impact on CCA's mission in the Upstate. And her story touched each of us.

When Ronica Shekar found a dog in her office parking lot one afternoon, she stepped in to help... Little did I know that a regular Friday would change my life forever! Last December, sweet Zoey was found roaming in my office parking lot in Piedmont. As soon as I saw her, I could see that she was a sweetheart. When I sat down to pet her, she immediately took to me, curled up on my lap to take a nap - and I was DONE!! It wasn't difficult for me to decide to take her home with me. I took her to the vet the next day - there was no tag/license, no microchip, no ads on the local lost dog channels even after a week's lookout - she was mine to keep!!!

A few weeks later, we were in for a surprise! During a check-up before her spay appointment, we were informed that Zoey was actually expecting and would be giving us 8-10 puppies soon!! My landlady was amazing enough to open her house for the great adventure that was about to come, and that was the very beginning of a wonderful, once-in-a-lifetime journey!

I love dogs but I'd never before seen a dog give birth, or seen newborn puppies before, let alone care for a whole litter. With lots of online research and some helpful tips from our vet, we took up the challenge!

On February 2, Zoey gave us nine adorable puppies: five girls and four boys, each one as cute as they could be!! I could spend a whole day just watching them...the whole thing was all truly mesmerizing! From the moment they started opening their eyes to the moment they gave their first barks and then the moment they first started walking before running and jumping around like crazy, I have lots of moments to cherish.

Before we knew it, they were eight weeks old and it was time for us to face the next challenge: finding forever homes for the nine pups!!

We were lucky to find homes for three of them almost immediately, but then had to reach out to CCA to seek help with the adoption of remaining pups. Within no time, we had applications flooding in and today, I'm extremely happy to say that all of the puppies are now in their forever homes!!

I will never forget these three/four months of my life, and I'd like to extend my sincere thanks to CCA for helping us give a happy ending to this story... And, also, a special thanks to Scout (our three-year-old doby), Ande, Cindy and my mom! I couldn't have done this without y'all!



Common foods toxic to dogs



BRING HAILEY HOME What I learned when my foster dog was on the run for TWLEVE DAYS.

Hailey was seized by Animal Control in November 2019, from an abusive and neglectful situation, where she lived her whole life on a chain, outside, exposed to the elements. She spent 4 months at Laurens County Animal Control, when she was rescued in February 2020, by Labor of Love Transport Rescue and she was placed in a foster home. Hailey was a very shutdown dog and totally petrified most of the time, after her rescue and foster placement.


On March 27, 2020, she went missing while at a vet clinic an hour away from her foster parent's home. She had to be seen due to difficulty breathing and coughing up blood, probably associated to the progression of her Heartworm disease. While she was at the clinic, she was taken outside of the building by the staff (outside of a fenced in area) without proper restraint, and she slipped the leash. She was chased away from the clinic by the staff.

Immediately after Hailey went missing, the following tools were used to find her - a dog tracking team, a pet detective, an animal communicator, drones, flyers, a billboard, feeding stations, traps, there was no time and expense spared to find Hailey. Hailey's foster parents drove two hours round trip every day, twice a day, to look for her.

There were no sightings of Hailey for 11 days. On the 10th day, a local lady that was helping to look for Hailey, observed an animal running across a busy road after midnight. She could not identify the animal, but still provided this sighting to Hailey's foster parents. There were new feeding stations with cameras placed in the area that the animal was seen running from and to. Within 24 hours of the new feeding station placement, Hailey was observed on one of the cameras less than a half a mile from the vet's office that she was lost from. Hailey's foster parents borrowed a trap from CCA, and set it in the location of the sighting. The food used in the trap was a KFC bowl with macaroni and cheese and extra gravy. Pieces of chicken were dispersed leading to the trap and inside the trap. The food was placed in the trap during the day, and a new piping hot batch was placed in at about 7 pm. Hailey was subsequently caught in the trap at 10:03 pm on the 12th day of her adventure. When Hailey's foster mom approached the trap, a sheet was placed over the trap to lessen Hailey's panic. The whole trap with Hailey inside was then transported to a secure location, where Hailey could be safely removed.

Since this adventure, Hailey has gained confidence and her personality is finally shining through. She now has a doggie friend that helps her with getting over her mental hurdles. Hailey has made such tremendous progress that she will be placed up for adoption very soon.

Foster Mom & Dad shortly after Hailey was trapped following 12 long days on the run. Many happy tears.



Prior to a dog getting lost:

- Make sure you microchip your pets.
- ☑ Always have a collar with tags/phone number on your pets leaving the household.
- Proper leashing harness and a slip lead or martingale collar and a slip lead especially if you are bringing a new dog into your household a new foster pet proper leashing is paramount.
- Make a scent article for your pet use a medical gauze strip while you are wearing gloves swipe the gauze strip across your dogs back and underbelly, place it in a freezer bag mark it with name and date and store in a freezer for up to 6 months redo every six months.

After getting lost:

- If you didn't have a scent article prior to your dog becoming lost create one. If you dog had their own blanket pick it up with gloves mark the side they laid on with a piece of tape and fold with scent to the inside of the item. Store in a sealed Ziploc bag. Keep in a cool place do not freeze. If your dog had a bed that only he/she used, cover it with a clean non scented towel and lay over the bed. The dog's scent will transfer onto the towel and you can use the towel as a scent article for future use.
- If lost near home hang your worn clothes outside of the home so the scent carries to lure the dog back in.
- Immediately post about your missing pet on Lost and Found pages, Craiglist, Social Media.
- Create flyers and immediately distribute in surrounding areas place flyers in plastic Ziploc bags so they are protected from the elements make sure the phone number you use for the flyers is one that someone will answer at all times the one time that you don't pick up could make a difference between finding your pet quickly or at all Place flyers in areas frequented by a lot of people gas stations, supermarket parking lots, vet offices. Follow any and all leads.
- ☑ Do not offer reward immediately, but you can do so after the first week.
- Flyers should not have your dog's name on it if people call out to your dog by name that may scare them off.
- Flyers should have DO NOT CHASE on them, and to contact you immediately.
- If you receive a phone call or a text telling you that someone found your pet, but instead of sending a photo, they say they need to verify your identity first by having you send them a verification code do not do so. This is a scam and if you send them the code forwarded by them, they will gain access to all your data in your phone.
- Immediately notify nearby shelters and check shelters in person on daily basis. Immediately notify all vet offices.
- Place an enlarged flyer on your car/each side, with a phone number and lost pet information on your windows basically make your car into a billboard for your pet.
- ☑ Go door to door and give out flyers in the area the dog was lost in.
- If you are able to hire a dog search team either immediately, or at least after a sighting.
- If you have a sighting of your dog, and the dog is at this point skittish, you will have to trap it. Reach out to local rescue groups who have experience in trapping dogs.
- Most importantly Do not give up looking for your pet. It is very easy to loose hope, but when you are getting to that point just think about your pup all alone out there without anyone to help them out keep looking for them.

Because of you, \$560 was raised and will be used so install cat wall boxes. Once installed, we'll share pictures of what you helped CCA do for our shelter cat residents!





Founded in 1980, Concerned Citizens for Animals is celebrating 39 years of improving the lives of homeless animals in the Upstate. Through our shelter operation, and a variety of community service programs, CCA offers a second chance to neglected, stray and abandoned animals.

As the oldest no-kill shelter in the Upstate, CCA provides treatment, sterilization, care, and a safe haven for its residents until loving homes are found. Prospective homes are screened, references are checked and home visits made to ensure the animals are placed with responsible, caring individuals and families.

CCA's Feral Cat Program employs the TNR (trap, neuter, and return) process to assist feral cat colony caretakers in maintaining the health of the colony and curbing the colony's growth. Our Low Cost Spay/Neuter Program is effective in alleviating animal suffering by reducing the number of unwanted canine and feline births in the Upstate.

The combined efforts of an involved management team, a dedicated caretaker and an active volunteer force create a powerful influence in the lives of the animals in our care and those in the community we serve.
